

## THIS WEEK'S TOPIC: MEANS OF TRANSPORT/DOPRAVA

TO GO = JÍT, JET

What's the difference? Before using it in Czech, you need to realize whether you are going on foot, or you are using some means of transport.

### JÍT

- to go on foot, to walk
- examples:

**Jdu** domů. = I am going home.

**Jdeš** ven? = Are you going out?

Jana **jde** do práce = Jana (= Jane) is going to work.

**Jdeme** do školy. = We are going to school.

**Jdete** do obchodu? = Are you going to the shop?

**Jdou** do supermarketu? = Are they going to the supermarket?

### JET

- to go by means of transport (eg. by bus, train, tram, taxi,...)
- examples:

**Jedu** domů autem./Jedu autem domů. = I am going home by car.

**Jedeš** teď trolejbusem? = Are you going by trolleybus now? (informal - 1 person)

Jana **jede** vlakem. = Jana (= Jane) is going by train.

**Jedeme** do školy autobusem. = We are going to school.

**Jedete** do obchodu tramvají? = Are you going to the shop by tram? (formal/group of people)

**Jedou** teď taxíkem\*? = Are they going by taxi now?

They sound so similar, right?

já jdu x já jedu

ty jdeš x ty jedeš

on jde x on jede

How can you remember the difference?

Check the infinitives: JÍT X JET

JET has all the forms with E: jedu jedeš, jede, jedeme, jedete, jedou
